Free mental health services address the unique needs of our young families

At Teen Parent Connection, we believe that long-term social and emotional support can change a young parent's life. That's why our programs are designed to serve families for up to five years - from start to finish. By investing our time in these families and listening to their stories, we learn so much about the unique challenges they face on a daily basis. We also begin to recognize when participants need additional support through our Individual, Couple, and Family Counseling Program.

Any parent could tell you that raising a child can feel overwhelming. However, many teen parents lack the information, support, and resources necessary to overcome their unique challenges of parenting, leaving them especially vulnerable to stress. Without a strong support network, young parents and their children face higher risks for depression and anxiety. Without support the consequences of these stressors can lead to increased risk of child abuse, neglect and family violence.

Now in its 5th year, TPC's Counseling Program works to connect participant families who are struggling to the



professional guidance they need to help them successfully navigate these challenges. Young families can meet their counselor on a weekly basis at their own home or the TPC office, whichever they prefer. Like all other services we provide, counseling is delivered to participants free of charge.

Because of the strength of our relationships with the families we serve, we have been very successful in helping them engage in this deeper level of service. Last year, 24 families received counseling services through TPC. New grant funding will allow us to not only expand these services for parents but will also provide additional level of training for staff.

STAFF SPOTLIGHT: Ariana Carlson, Parent Group Coordinator



Teen Parent Connection Young Parent Support Groups allow adolescent parents to find commonality, strength, and encouragement to help them meet the demands of parenthood. Leading this effort is Parent Group Coordinator Ariana Carlson.

Ariana developed a strong sense of devotion for the nonprofit sector while volunteering during high school. The experience working on prevention programming for middle and high school students gave her a deep appreciation for nonprofits working

Peer Prevention Program: Promoting Community Health

Each year nearly 500 babies are born to teenage mothers in DuPage County. Teen Parent Connection's Peer Prevention program works throughout our community delivering abstinencebased pregnancy prevention programs to middle and high school students. Our goal is to educate students on the realities and responsibilities of adolescent parenthood and reduce the number of births to teens.

Delivered to nearly 14,000 students last school year, this program empowers middle and high school students with the education they need to make informed decisions about their sexual health. Trained Health and Peer Educators shared this message with 47 DuPage County and surrounding area schools last year.

Elizabeth Witman, Program Manager and former TPC participant, is a qualified health educator who engages students in educational activities focused on the prevention of pregnancy, sexually transmitted infections (STIs), and HIV/AIDS. "As a former teen parent and current prevention program supervisor, I believe that giving teens knowledge of the realities of teenage pregnancy, and information and skills to prevent it, enables them to make healthy and informed decisions," Elizabeth reflects. Christine Wulbecker, Bi-lingual Community Engagement Coordinator provides additional help leading a portion of the health presentations. Our abstinence-based health education provides students with medically accurate and consistent messaging.

Our prevention program is powerful because we feature a Peer Educator in partnership with Elizabeth and Christine. Peer Educators are young parents and TPC participants who are trained to share their unique story reflecting the health, social, emotional, and financial consequences they have personally experienced since becoming a teen parent. Monique is one of the many trained Peer Educators who shares her journey as a young parent with students.

Monique became pregnant when she was 18 years old and just starting college. Her dreams of a typical college career full of campus life and friends quickly changed. Today, she shares her story of becoming a young mom to son Jayden in the hopes that her challenges will inspire students to make informed decisions that will not lead them to young parenthood.

Students who participated in the Peer Prevention Program are listening, and last program year reported the following:

After this presentation, I feel:

"100 times more educated on teen births and how much it affects people's lives." (Male, 16)

"That being a teen mom is a lot more difficult than portrayed on "Teen Mom" (Male, 15)

Because of this presentation I plan to:

"Stay abstinent, finish high school and college, get a job, and then think about starting a family." (Female, 15)

"Stay the way I am now and set boundaries in my relationship." (Female, 15)

"Not be sexually active until I am emotionally, mentally, physically, spiritually, and financially ready to endure the possible consequences of an unplanned pregnancy." (Female, 15)
